





Economically weaker students are provided with Scholarships and Fee concessions by the Management and it allows payment of fees in installments. A large number of them are vernacular students, without a fair competence in English. Besant Evening College offers these special students, the same facilities and quality of education that its full time day-students receive.

They work closely with a committed faculty, made up of accomplished and experienced teacher-scholars. COLLEGE REGULATIONS

We entreat upon every student to abide by the regulations of the college stated in the calendar and such other regulations which may be formulated by the Principal from time to time and help us accomplish the noble mission we have undertaken. Non-compliance with any of these regulations will invite disciplinary action. Principal's decision will be final in these matters.

- Every student gets an identity card and a college calendar. He/She shall enter the required details in the calendar and is expected to carry both to the college daily. Any lawful authority of the college has the right to ask the student to produce either of these at any time.
- 2. All the students should attend classes regularly. If their presence is unavoidable for any important occasion within the family, parents are required to take prior permission on behalf of their wards by filling the format provided for the purpose in the calendar. Such permission will not be granted on the days of exams. Absence without seeking prior permission will not be condoned unless the reason is illness or some other equally serious matter.
- Students are expected to keep the classrooms and the college premises clean. Action will be taken against those who litter the classrooms and campus.
- Every student is expected to treat the members of the staff with respect and salute them when she/he meets them for the first time every day.
- Serious cognizance will be taken on any misuse of college property. Scribbling on walls and etching on desks and benches will be treated as serious offences.
- The students shall not carry cellular phones in the college campus. If any student is found to possess a mobile phone, the phone will confiscated, parents will be informed and will be charged a fine of Rs.500/-.
- All official letters addressed to the Principal should have reply postage enclosed.
- The students are not permitted to conduct tours and picnics without the consent of the Principal.
- The students should take care of their personal belongings and the college authorities cannot be held responsible for any loss.
- 10. While the college does not hold itself responsible for a student's conduct outside its premises, however the Principal may take cognizance of any serious misconduct outside the college which is likely to reflect badly upon the reputation of the college and take whatever action she deems fit on the offenders.
- The students are expected to maintain high standard of behaviours both inside and outside of the college.

- Irregularity of attendance, indifference to studies and avoidance of assignments, tests and examinations held by the college and discourtesy to staff members will render the students liable for disciplinary measures by the Principal.

ADMISSION

Students who have passed second P.U.C. Examination or any other examination considered as equivalent there to by the Mangalore university are eligible for admission for degree course.

Withdrawal of Admission:

Candidates withdrawing from the college after admission, will have to forego all fees paid by them. Transfer certificate shall be issued only to those who have cleared all the dues to the college. Once a student's name is entered on the rolls of the college for any part of a term, he/she has to pay the fees for the entire year.

ATTENDANCE

- 1. Students should attend classes regularly.
- 2. Absence from the class should properly be accounted for in the leave record.
- If a student has to remain absent from the class for participating in cultural/sports events, he/she should get the signature of the staff in charge in the space provided in the calendar.
- 4. Attendance is taken every hour at the commencement of the class.
- 5. Students are warned that they should get a minimum of 75% of the attendance for each subject, failing which they will not be eligible to appear for university examinations or for promotion to the next higher classes. The Principal will not recommend applications for condonations of attendance if the absence in Principal's option, cannot be justified.

LIBRARY

Library Rules:

- 1. The library is open from 03.00 PM to 08.45 PM on all working days.
- Students have to sign the 'User Register' kept at the entrance of the library while entering the library.
- 3. Strict silence should be observed in the library.
- 4. Book circulation will be made through 'Bar Coding System'.
- Each student will be issued two tickets for borrowing books from the library. Loss of these tickets should be immediately reported to the librarian. A duplicate ticket will be issued at a cost of Rs.10/- on submission of a declaration by the concerned student.
- A student may take 2 books at a time, but both books should not be from the same section.
- If the due date falls on a holiday, the books shall be returned on the next working day.
- For renewal of any book after the due date, the particular book should be produced at the time of renewal.
- Books borrowed from the library may not be kept for more than two weeks. A fine of Rs. 2/- per day per book will be imposed for every additional day's delay there after.
- If the book is not returned to the library within a month of borrowing, the student's name will be notified as defaulter and his right of borrowing further books will be forfeited.
- For restoring the right of borgdwing the books the defaulters have to submit their explanation to the Principal in writing.
- 12. Student should not sub-lend the books borrowed from the library.
- Any book lent out may be recalled by the librarian at any time before the due date for returning.
- 14. Borrowers shall not write upon, damage or make any mark upon the books.
- Any damage to the furniture or any property in the library will have to be made good by the person concerned.
- The library tickets should be returned at the end of the year or at the time of leaving the college or any other date specified by the Principal.

- The books will be issued to the students on all working days to all the classes. Students have to apply before 06.00 PM.
- Newspapers, Magazines and reference books will be referred in the Library only.
- 19. Question papers are referred in the library by producing Identity Card.
- 20. Books on deposit basis for final year degree students will be issued at the end of the academic year for the examination. Amount of deposit will be notified during the period and will be refunded while returning the book.
- 21. Internet facility is available. A fee of Rs.10 per hour will be charged.
- Photo Copying (Xerox) facility is also available a fee of Re. 1 per page will be charged.

Book Bank:

Books under 'Book Bank Scheme' are available to the deserving students. Application forms are available in the library to apply for the scheme. Such books may be retained by the students till the end of the each semester.

Best user of the Library:

The college awards 'Best user of the library' every year. The selection will be made by the library committee based on the regular visit to the library issue of books, reference to journals and books, use of computer/internet facilities and good discipline in the library.

COLLEGE EXAMINATIONS & TESTS

The college will hold periodical examinations and tests to assess the student's progress in studies. Internal assessment marks for every semester will be awarded on the basis of two examinations, and one assignment.

In addition to term examinations, the student's progress will be assessed through tests, and paper presentations.

Malpractice on the part of a student of the college in a college examination/ test will entail debarring of the student from the rest of the examination/ test.

If a student who has been selected for the award of any scholarship/ loan scholarship, fee concession stays away from a college examination or test, she will forfeit such aid.

Parents have to meet the Class Mentors personally to collect the progress cards of their wards.



CERTIFICATES

- All applications for certificates must be made to the Principal in writing. Certificates must be taken from the office in person. If they have to be sent by the post, a stamped self addressed envelope must be left at the office. Certificates and Mark cards will not be handed over to unauthorized persons.
- 2. Applications for certificates should contain the following particulars:
 - a. The student's name and initials.
 - b. The date of joining the college and the class in which the student was originally enrolled.
 - c. The class in which the student was reading at the time of leaving the college and his/her register number.
 - d. The language under Group-I and the Optional subject under Group-II.
 - The University examinations passed with Register Number and year of passing.
- 3. Certificate will not be issued on less than 48 hours notice.
- Pass certificate of University examination will be Issued by the university on application to the register of evaluation after payment of the prescribed fees.
- 5. Attested copies of certificates may be obtained from any gazette officer.
- Students who join other Universities will be required to produce their migration certificate. To obtain this, it is necessary to take 'No Dues Certificate' from the college and pay to the University the prescribed fees of Rs.5/-
- Application for Duplicate Marks Card should be made directly to the University.
- Transfer Certificate/Conduct Certificate is issued only when a student withdraw from the college.

B.2. DURATION OF THE PROGRAMMES:

The duration of Bachelor Degree Programmes shall extend over six semesters (three academic years) of 16 weeks each. Each semester shall consist of 16 weeks of study 9excluding the time spent for the conduct of final examination of each semester).

C.3. ELIGIBILITY FOR ADMISSION:

3.1 B.A

A Candidate who has passed the two years Pre University examination conducted by the Pre-University Education Board in the State of Karnataka or any other examination considered as equivalent thereto by Mangalore University is eligible for admission to these programmes.

3.2 B.Sc.

Same as 3.1

- 3.3 B.Com., B.B.M
- (a) Same as 3.1
- (b) Admission of Diploma Holders in Commercial/ Secretarial Practice to B.Com. Degree: Candidate successful at the diploma examination Secretarial/ Commercial practice conducted by the Government of Karnataka may be directly admitted to the III Semester (Second year) B.Com degree programme. Such candidates are not eligible for ranking.

D.4 MAXIMUM PERIOD FOR COMPLETION OF THE PROGRAMME

The candidate shall complete the programme within the period as prescribed in the regulation governing the maximum period for completing various degree/ diploma programmes from the dates of admissions (Double the

25

duration stipulated for the programme reckoned from the year of admission to the programme). The term completing the programmes means passing all the prescribed examinations of the programme to become eligible for the degree.

No candidate shall be permitted to appear for the examinations after the prescribed maximum period for Completing the programme.

E.5 MEDIUM OF INSTRUCTION:

The medium of instruction and examination shall be English/Kannada.

F.6 SUBJECTS OF STUDY:

Subjects of study shall comprise the following:

6.1 Group-I LANGUAGE

The Candidates shall opt for General and Communicative English as Compulsory subjects and one of the languages listed below:

- Kannada, Hindi and English
- a) Additional English shall be offered only for Foreign, NRI, Anglo-Indian and other Indian students whose mother tongue is other than the languages listed above.
- 6.2 Group-II OPTIONAL SUBJECTS

Details are given in the college prospectus.

- 6.3 Group-III:
 - a) Foundation Course (Common for all courses): (i) Constitution of India and (ii) Human Rights, Gender and Environmental Studies shall be Compulsory subjects, alternately, in the first and second semesters.
 - b) General Studies: It shall be studied as compulsory subject in the III Semester of B.A/B.Sc. Degree Programme.
 - c) Interdisciplinary Subjects: Computer Applications or Human Resource Development Studies or Art and Culture or any other subjects as prescribed by the University shall be studied in the IV semester of B.A degree programmes.
 - d) An interdisciplinary subject which a student opts for shall be other than those studied under optional.

6.4 Co-curricular and Extra Curricular Activities

A students shall opt for any one of the following activities in the first four semesters offered in the college.

A) N.S.S.

B) Sports and Games

C) Other Co- and Extra – Curricular Activities as prescribed by the university. 26

G.7 ATTENDANCE AND CHANGE OF SUBJECTS:

- 7.1 A candidate shall be considered to have satisfied the requirement of attendance for a semester if he/ she attends not less than 75% of the number of classes actually held up to the end of the semester in each of the subjects. However, the shortage of attendance of students whose attendance is 60% and above but below 75% may be condoned by the University on payment of condonation fee as prescribed by the University and by following the rules prescribed for condonation. There shall be no minimum attendance requirement for the Co- and Extra-Curricular activities.
- 7.2 A candidate who does not satisfy the requirement of attendance even in on subject shall not be permitted to take the whole University examination of the semester and he/she shall seek readmission to that semester in a subsequent year.
- 7.3 Option to change a Language/ Subject is exercisable only once within four weeks from the date of commencement of the I Semester on payment of fee prescribed by the University.
- 7.4 Whenever a change in a subject permitted the attendance in the changed subject shall be calculated by taking into consideration the attendance in the previous subject studied by the candidate.
- 7.5 If a candidate represents his/her institution/ University/Karnataka State/ Nation in Sports/ NCC/ NSS/ Cultural or any officially sponsored activities he/ she may be permitted to claim attendance for actual number of days participated based on the recommendation of the Head of the Institution concerned. If a candidate is selected to participate in national level events such as Republic Day Parade etc., he/ she may be permitted to claim attendance for actual number of days participated based on the recommendation of the Head of the Institution concerned.

H.8 INTERNALASSESSMENT:

- 8.1 The Internal assessment marks shall be based on two tests or one test and one assignment. The test shall be of at least 1 hour duration to be held during the semester. The average of the two shall be taken as the internal assessment marks.
- 8.2 The marks of the internal assessment shall be published on the notice board of the college for information of the students.
- 8.3 There shall be no minimum in respect of internal assessment marks.
- 8.4 Internal assessment marks shall be shown separately in the marks card. A candidate who has failed or rejected the result, shall retain the internal assessment marks.

8.5 Internship/ Industrial Practicum/ Project work in the degree programmes classified on the basis of aggregate marks obtained in all the six.

If any shall be prescribed for the course.

1.9 REGISTRATION FOR EXAMINATIONS:

A candidate shall register for all the papers of a semester when he/ she appears for the examination of that semester for the first time.

J.10 CONDUCT OF EXAMINATIONS:

- 10.1 There shall be Theory and Practical Examinations at the end of each semester, ordinarily during October/ November for odd semesters and during April/ May for even semesters, as prescribed in the Scheme of Examinations.
- 10.2 The candidate shall submit the record book for practical examination duly certified by the course teacher and the H.O.D./ staff in-charge. It shall be evaluated at the end of the Semester at the practical examination.

K.11 MINIMUM FOR A PASS:

- 11.1 No candidate shall be declared to have passed the Semester Examination as the case may be under Group I/ Group II/ Group III (expect in Co. And Extra Curricular Activities) unless he/ she obtains not less than 35% marks in written examination and 35% marks in the aggregate of written examination and internal assessment put together in each of the subjects, 35% marks practical examination (for subjects with practicals) and 35% marks in Project work and
- viva wherever prescribed. 11.2 If a candidate fails in any subject, either in theory or in practical, he/ she shall appear for that subject only at any subsequent regular examination, within the maximum period prescribed for completing the programme. He/she must obtain the minimum marks for a pass in that subject (theory and practicals separately) as stated in para (11.1) above.

L12. CARRY OVER:

A candidate who falls in a lower semester examination may go to the higher semester, However,

a) No candidate shall be permitted to take the fifth semester examination unless he / she passes all the papers of the first semester examination and

b) No candidate shall be permitted to take the sixth semester examination unless he/ she passes all the papers of the first and second semester examinations. 28


