Dr. Annie Besant is one of those foreigners who inspired the love of the country among Indians. She declared in 1918 in her paper "New India". "I love the Indian people as I love none other, and... my heart and my mind... have long been laid on the altar of the Motherland. "Annie Besant, born of Irish parents in London on October 1, 1847, made India her home from November, 1893. An orator and writer with poetic temperament, Dr. Besant was a veritable tornado of power and passion. By her eloquence, firmness of convictions and utter sincerity she attracted some of the best minds of the country for the national cause.

Our Founder President



Our founder President Sri Manel Srinivas Nayak was an eminent personality who has made exemplary contribution to the political, social and educational progress in the district of Dakshina Kannada. In the political and civil life of our District, he was a force to reckon with, as an effective organizer, powerful and impressive speaker in English, Kannada and Konkani. He was the Chairman of the Mangalore Municipality from 1958 to 1961 and he steered his council with the skill, dignity, psychology and love he possessed as a devoted tireless servant of the people. He showed great foresight for the needs of Mangalore city and for Dakshina Kannada in general. He also served as President, Bharat Scouts and Guides, Dakshina Kannada for several years. He also served as President of Mangalore Cheshire home for over twenty years and during his time a new building was put up. His other achievements are also well known.

As a congressman he served the city as a Municipal Chairman, with rare distinction; as a member of the Karnataka State Legislative Assembly for two

terms, he was Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Legislature. He was a Director of the Canara Bank Ltd., one of the leading Banking Institutions of our country. He was President of the Kanara Chamber of Commerce & Industry, following in the footsteps of his late father Mr. Manel Annappa Nayak who was one of the founders of the Chamber. He has been a trustee of Temples. Thus he has truly done his work for God and Country. Besides being a good businessman he has been generous to all good causes; incurables, the poor and helpless women and children.

Srinivas Nayak, provided leadership to the Women's National Education Society and its various activities in the education field. He had the magic touch and the Institutions developed from a mere High School to Degree Colleges taking their position as premier Educational Institutions particularly in the field of Education. In his hands Besant Institutions assumed altogether different dimensions. He first started the Besant Evening College in the 1976 with the motive of offering an opportunity to the working men and women to educate themselves. Later he started the Besant women's college and a few years later the Besant English School.

A habitual wearer of Khadi, Sri Nayak has lived a simple, unostentatious life as a Gandhian. He has contributed richly to the community life of the Gowda Saraswath Brahman Samaj to which he belongs worked as a Trustee of Shree Venkataramana Temple, Mangalore, Sri Srinivasa Nigamagama Pathashala Mangalore etc. The long public life of Sri Nayak is both inspiring and worthy of emulation by our younger generation. Until an advanced age he toiled ceaselessly for the noble cause of education.

About the College

“Going to college means different things to different people. For some, collegiate education rebuilds their lives, for some others it is the bridge to a better path. For many others, it’s a plunge out of a dark night...to a day that shines as bright as the lights on the campus they walk to each evening.”

Every evening, when Besant Evening College turns on its yellow lights, a few hundred clerks and receptionists, newspaper boys, plumbers, electricians, welders canteen boys, sweepers, hawkers, labourers, milk vendors and then some CA and ICWAI students wrap up a tough day’s work and rush in for their lectures. Once in, they are in a world where all they are expected to do is hold a pen and pay attention. Located in the heart of the beautiful coastal city of Mangalore, Besant Evening College is a UGC recognized Arts and Commerce College, affiliated to the Mangalore University. Founded in 1976 by a great visionary Sri Manel Srinivas Nayak, the College is among the city’s top colleges for quality education, student life and affordability. Its strategic location and easy accessibility combined with contemporary facilities and useful programs, attracts students from across the city and neighboring villages. It is a co-educational college which charges reasonably low fees and admits students who have limited economic resources so that they “Learn while they Earn”. Dedicated to the cause of education for almost a century, Women’s National Education Society is the management of the Besant Institutions. They offer the gift of higher education to generations of students who would have been denied this privilege in the normal course.

Besant Evening College offers undergraduate academic program leading to Bachelor of Commerce degree and a post-graduate program in Commerce leading to Master of Commerce degree with specialization in either Finance or HR fields. The college holds classes in the late evening from 4.00 pm to 9.00 pm. The coursework is the same which is taught in the day colleges but with some flexibility to help working students of a disadvantaged background get access to higher education. Our cut off for admissions is a lofty 35 per cent at the second attempt, because our philosophy is that someone motivated to try higher education needs to be given a chance to develop untapped potential which has not yet emerged for lack of academic support. The aim is to provide

higher education to young people who cannot afford to do a full time academic course because they have to earn their living. Economically weaker students are provided with Scholarships and Fee concessions by the Management and it allows payment of fees in installments. A large number of them are vernacular students, without a fair competence in English. Besant Evening College students get the same facilities and quality of education that the students receive in the day college.

They work closely with a committed faculty, made up of accomplished and experienced teacher-scholars. Our students enjoy the individual, personal attention that only a small college can provide and, at the same time, attend classes and participate in extra-curricular activities that offer an impressive array of intellectual challenges and rewards. Extra-curricular activities would not seem convenient for these working students, but give them a stage and they are eager to perform, often rivalling the cultural talents of the best students in the day colleges.

The college, centrally located in the City of Mangalore has a campus area of 1.02 acres and built up area of 11633.091 sq.mts. Well-planned and aesthetically designed buildings provide an excellent environment for academic and all support activities. Some of the physical facilities we have in the college are spacious and well ventilated classrooms fitted with projectors to take classes using power point, a computer lab, a commerce lab and a language lab all equipped with interactive projectors, an audio visual room, a state of the art auditorium, a very good library, a canteen a commerce lab and a language lab all of these equipped with interactive projectors and digital displays, helps the students to upgrade their skills so that they can cope with academics. The Computer Centre gives them the basic training in computers and also in Accounting Software like TALLY. At present, the College has a regular Principal and 23 faculty members; the student strength is 366 and student-teacher ratio is 18:1.

The College sensitizes its students on gender and environmental issues through its curriculum, celebrating national/international days, organizing awareness/sensitizing seminar, symposium, drama, quiz competition etc. The college has been able to make significant contribution to the society with the support of various local organisations.

- Two Villages; Ammunje and Kariangala have been adopted for Outreach work.
- The Outreach Cell of the College undertakes community development activities in the adopted villages in collaboration with local bodies.
- Through the NSS and Red Cross units an Annual Camp and Economic Survey, Awareness campaigns, competitions and exhibitions for the prevention of epidemics and infectious diseases, were conducted successfully in these villages.
- The college has forged relationships with many local authorities such as Zilla Panchayat and Mangalore City Corporation to conduct outreach and extension programmes.
- Blood Donation Camps and Health Rallies are held in collaboration with hospitals, for the adopted villages and also for construction workers, campaigns and other programmes for the protection and preservation of the environment, were conducted.
- The college has collaborations with other Institutions, NGOs, GOs, Industries and other Agencies for Research, Extension, Outreach Activities, Curriculum Development and Student Training and Placement.

The college follows the general education curriculum prescribed by the university. This common curriculum has created and sustained a community of discourse shared by the current student body with generations of alumni. The vitality of any tradition depends upon its constant renewal, and for this reason, among others, the college believes in supplementing its curriculum with add- on courses such as basic computer skills, Tally for accounting, soft skills, language skills and other skill development courses. National seminars and workshops are a prominent feature of the academic calendar. Weekly value education sessions are held on Thursdays to sensitize students on contemporary social and personal issues. The city of Mangalore in which the college is nestled - is renowned for its banks, educational institutions including medical and engineering colleges, small businesses, and software companies. Added to this, the rich culture and coastal environment - serve as living and learning laboratory experiences in business, science, technology, languages and the arts for the students who choose to study here.

COLLEGE REGULATIONS

We entreat upon every student to abide by the regulations of the college stated in the calendar and such other regulations which may be formulated by the Principal from time to time and help us accomplish the noble mission we have undertaken. Non-compliance with any of these regulations will invite disciplinary action. Principal's decision will be final in these matters.

1. Every student gets an identity card and a college calendar. He/She shall enter the required details in the calendar and is expected to carry both to the college daily. Any lawful authority of the college has the right to ask the student to produce either of these at any time.
2. All the students should attend classes regularly. If their presence is unavoidable for any important occasion within the family, parents are required to take prior permission on behalf of their wards by filling the format provided for the purpose in the calendar. Such permission will not be granted on the days of exams. Absence without seeking prior permission will not be condoned unless the reason is illness or some other equally serious matter.
3. Students are expected to keep the classrooms and the college premises clean. Action will be taken against those who litter the classrooms and campus.
4. Every student is expected to treat the members of the staff with respect and salute them when she/he meets them for the first time every day.
5. Serious cognizance will be taken on any misuse of college property. Scribbling on walls and etching on desks and benches will be treated as serious offences.
6. **The students shall not carry cellular phones to the classes. If any student is found to possess a mobile phone, the phone will be confiscated, parents will be informed and will be charged a fine of Rs.500/-.**
7. All official letters addressed to the Principal should have reply postage enclosed.
8. The students are not permitted to conduct tours and picnics without the consent of the Principal.
9. The students should take care of their personal belongings and the college authorities cannot be held responsible for any loss.

10. While the college does not hold itself responsible for a student's conduct outside the premises, however the Principal may take cognizance of any serious misconduct outside the college which is likely to reflect badly upon the reputation of the college and take whatever action he deems fit on the offenders.
11. The students are expected to maintain high standard of behaviours both inside and outside of the college.
12. Irregularity of attendance, indifference to studies and avoidance of assignments, tests and examinations held by the college and discourtesy to staff members will render the students liable for disciplinary measures by the Principal.
13. The students should not be found in other parts of the college campus without valid reasons. They shall not be noisy or in other ways disturb peace of campus.
14. The student shall not indulge in any ragging or teasing or in any way cause harm or injury to their fellow student. Any such behaviour will render them liable for strict disciplinary action by the principal.
15. The students are required to maintain modesty in dress. They are not permitted to wear sleeveless, short, transparent and tight fitting tops and jeans and trousers of a close and clinging fit.

ADMISSION

Students who have passed second P.U.C. Examination or any other examination considered as equivalent there to by the Mangalore University are eligible for admission for degree course.

Withdrawal of Admission :

Candidates **withdrawing** from **the college after admission, will have to forego all fees paid by them.** Transfer certificate shall be issued only to those who have cleared all the dues to the college. Once a student's name is entered on the rolls of the college for any part of a term, he/she has to pay the fees for the entire year.

ATTENDANCE

1. Students should attend classes regularly.
2. Absence from the class should properly be accounted for in the leave record.
3. If a student has to remain absent from the class for participating in cultural/ sports events, he/she should get the signature of the staff in charge in the space provided in the calendar.
4. Attendance is taken every hour at the commencement of the class.
5. Students are warned that they should get a **minimum of 75% of the attendance for each subject**, failing which they will not be eligible to appear for university examinations or for promotion to the next higher classes.

FEE REGULATIONS

1. The tuition fees for the year shall be paid in one lumpsum at the time of admission. However, in the case of deserving student the correspondent in consultation with the Principal can provide on more installment. The second installment shall be paid on or before the 30th Sept. every year or before the payment of odd Semester Examination Fees.
2. If the student discontinue during the middle of the year he/she shall have no claim for remission of fees.
3. In the event of failure to comply with the deadline of the 30th September for making the payment of second installment, a fine of Rs.50/- per day shall be charged. However, the management in extreme cases readmit the student with a readmission fee of Rs.500/-.
4. Fees once paid will not be refunded.

LIBRARY RULES

1. The library is kept open from 2.00 pm to 9.00 pm on all working days. During semester examination library remains open from 8.00 am to 9.00 pm.
2. Students have to sign the 'User Register' kept at the entrance of the library while entering the library.
3. Strict silence should be observed in the library.
4. Book circulation will be made through 'Bar Coding System'.
5. Each student will be issued two tickers for borrowing books from the library. Loss of these tickets should be immediately reported to the librarian. A duplicate ticket will be issued at a cost of Rs. 10/- on submission of a declaration by the concerned student.
6. A student may take 2 books at a time, but both books should not be from the same section.
7. If the due date falls on a holiday, the books shall be returned on the next working day.
8. For renewal of any book after the due date, the particular book should be produced at the time of renewal.
9. Books borrowed from the library may not be kept for more than two weeks. A fine of Rs 2/- per day per book will be imposed for every additional day's delay there after.
10. If the book is not returned to the library within a month of borrowing, the student's name will be notified as defaulter and his right of borrowing further books will be forfeited.
11. For restoring the right of borrowing the books the defaulters have to submit their explanation to the librarian in writing.
12. Student should not sub-lend the books borrowed from the library.
13. Any book lent out may be recalled by the librarian at any time before the due date for returning.
14. Borrowers shall not write upon, damage or make any mark upon the books.
15. Any damage to the furniture or any property in the library will have to be made by the person concerned.

16. The borrowers tickets should be returned at the end of the year or at the time of leaving the college or any other date specified by the Librarian.
17. The books will be issued to the students on all working days to all the classes. Students have to apply before 6.00 pm.
18. Newspapers, Magazines and reference books will be referred in the Library only.
19. Question papers are referred in the library by producing identity Card.
20. Books on deposit basis for final year degree students will be issued at the end of the academic year for the examination. Amount of deposit will be notified during the period and will be refunded while returning the book.
21. Internet facility is available at free of cost.
22. Photo Copying (xerox) and Printing facility are also available - a fee of Rs. 1.00 per page will be charged.

Book Bank:

Books under 'Book Bank Scheme' are available to the deserving students.

Application forms are available in the library to apply for the scheme. Such books may be retained by the students till the end of the each semester.

Best user of the Library:

The college awards 'Best user of the library' every year. The selection will be made by the library committee based on the regular visit to the library borrowal of books, reference to journals and books, use of computer/internet facilities and good discipline in the library.

COLLEGE EXAMINATIONS & TESTS:

The college will hold periodical examinations and tests to assess the student's progress in studies. Internal assessment marks for every semester will be awarded on the basis of two examinations.

In addition to term examinations, the student's progress will be assessed through tests, assignments and paper presentations.

Malpractice on the part of a student of the college in a college examination/ test will entail debarring of the student from the rest of the examination/tests.

If a student who has been selected for the award of any scholarship/loan Scholarship, fee concession stays away from a college examination or test, he/she will forfeit such aid.

Parents have to meet the Class mentors personally to collect the progress cards of their wards

CERTIFICATES

1. All applications for certificates must be made to the Principal in writing. Certificates must be taken from the office in person. If they have to be sent by the post, a stamped self addressed envelope must be left at the office. Certificates and mark cards will not be handed over to unauthorized persons.
2. Applications for certificates should contain the following particulars:
 - a. The student's name and initials.
 - b. The date of joining the college and the class in which the student was originally enrolled.
 - c. The class in which the student was studying at the time of leaving the college and his/her register number.
 - d. The language under Group-I and the optional subject under Group - II
 - e. The University examinations passed with Register Number and year of passing.
3. Certificate will not be issued on less than 48 hours notice.
4. Pass Certificate of University examination will be issued by the university on application to the registrar of evaluation after payment of the prescribed fees.
5. Attested copies of certificates may be obtained from any gazette officer.
6. Students who join other Universities will be required to produce their migration certificate. To obtain this, it is necessary to take 'No Due Certificate' from the college.
7. Application for Duplicate Marks Card should be made directly to the University.
8. Transfer Certificate/Conduct Certificate is issued only when a student withdraws from the college.

B.Com - A candidate who has passed two years Pre-University Examination conducted by the Pre-University Education Board in the State of Karnataka or any other examination considered as equivalent there to shall be eligible for admission.

M.Com - Candidates who have passed the B.Com/BBA Degree Examination of Mangalore University or any other University considered as equivalent thereto shall be eligible for the admission provided they have obtained not less than 45% (40% for SC/ST Category-I candidates) marks in an aggregate in all the subjects excluding languages.

B.COM (BASIC/HONS)

Programme Objectives:

2. Enables the students to know the modern strategic marketing concept & to study consumer behaviour.

CMH455: BUSINESS RESEARCH METHODS

Objective: The course is envisaged to provide the students with the knowledge and skill related to conduct of research related to business and familiarise the students with the technicalities of executing a research assignment.

Outcomes :

1. Enables the students to understand the techniques of doing research in the field of business.
2. Equips the students with skills of conducting business research.

CMH456: INTERNATIONAL BUSINESS

Objective:

- 1) Familiarized the students with functions and practice of International business.
- 2) Enable them get global perspective on issues related to FDI, forex market and globalization.

Outcomes :

1. Exposes the students to various concepts & business models of business, industry & commerce.
2. Familiarizes the students with political, social, economical, legal & technological environment of international business.

CMH457: ADVANCED COST ACCOUNTING

Objective: To provide the students with an in-depth knowledge of advanced approaches of Cost Accounting in order to enable them to apply costing methods and techniques so as to assist management in taking appropriate decisions

Outcomes : Provides an understanding of the basic principles of advanced cost accounting and equips the students with the skills of application of cost accountings.

CMH 502: ARTIFICIAL AND BUSINESS INTELLIGENCE

Objective: In the business world, competition is the main factor, intelligence is prerequisite for understand to meet competition. AI and BI are essential learning and analytical concepts. So that, students can enhance their intelligence and they can take-up career in these fields.

Outcomes : Familiarizes the students with the areas applications of artificial and business intelligence.

CMH503: BUSINESS ETHICS AND CORPORATE SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY

Objective: To make the students acquire knowledge of ethical issues, social responsibility and corporate governance practices in corporate.

Outcomes :

1. Creates an awareness of various aspects of business ethics and corporate social responsibilities.
2. Provides an understanding of the various areas of rigorous research in the field CSR.

CMH504: E-COMMERCE**Objectives:**

1. To understand the nature of E-Commerce business and its various dimensions.
2. To Identify the various strategies and advanced concept of web-based commerce.
3. To understand the importance and role of E-Commerce and M-Commerce business environment.
4. To provide insights to the students on E-Commerce models.

Outcomes : Enables the students to know the E-Commerce framework and familiarizes with e-commerce and world wide web & the applications of electronic data interchange.

CMS 505: INDIAN ACCOUNTING STANDARDS AND PRACTICE

Objective : To familiarize and acquaint the student the recent developments in International Accounting Standards and various financial reporting practices at the global level.

Outcomes : Familiarizes the IFRS s and their applications in the field business, commerce & industry.

CMS 511: OPTIONAL (TAX): DIRECT TAXES

Objective: The subject equips students with tools to effectively manage income and expenditure and offers a better understanding of tax savings. It provides basic understanding of tax concepts and familiarize with filing of tax returns for different heads of income. Students will be gaining knowledge about taxation and methodology based on practical aspects.

Outcomes : Introduces students to basic concepts in direct taxes and helps them to apply the various provisions.

CMS512: OPTIONAL (TAX): GOODS AND SERVICES TAX

Objective: A. To impart students with knowledge about GST and its features. B. To give insight on the taxes influencing a corporate entity particularly in GST system. C. To orient the students on the procedures and formalities to be adhered with regard to GST profiles. **Outcomes :** Introduces students to basic concepts in GRT and custom duty.

CMS551: RETAIL MANAGEMENT

Objectives: The course aims at providing students with an understanding of structure, organizations, operation and Current Trends in Indian retail sector. And also provides knowledge about retail marketing and legal compliances

Outcomes : Helps the students develop analytical skills to identify retail business opportunities and conditions for access to potential markets.

CMH553: RISK AND INSURANCE MANAGEMENT

Objectives:

1. To understand the nature of various insurance policies and its dimensions.
2. To learn the insurance and risk management strategies.
3. To understand the importance of corporate risks and individual risks and mitigation strategies.
4. To provide the risk handling methods.

Outcomes : Offers the students the necessary knowledge & skills to be able to understand the present and future problems in the financial and insurance world.

CMH 554: INTERNATIONAL FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT

OBJECTIVE:

- A. To orient the students on global business environment and international markets.
- B. To make students understand the various risks an enterprise is exposed to on account of international transactions.
- C. To provide knowledge and skills for hedging foreign currency risks.

Outcomes : Explains the basic features and functions of international financial systems & develops & appreciation in foreign exchange exposure and management.

CMS561: OPTIONAL (TAX): CORPORATE TAX PLANNING

Objective:

The aim of this course is to familiarize the student with major latest provisions of the Indian tax laws and related judicial pronouncements pertaining to corporate enterprises having implications for various aspects of Corporate planning with a view to derive maximum possible tax benefits admissible under the law.

Outcomes : Enables the students to understand tax planning strategies and helps them job opportunities.

CMS 562: OPTIONAL (TAX): CUSTOM DUTY AND GST ANALYSIS

Objective: The course is designed to provide students, a thorough and detailed knowledge of service tax, its systems and operations; CST, System of one country one tax and its operations and an overview of Goods and Service Tax structures.

Outcomes : It helps the students to understand the basic concepts of goods and services tax and to acquaint with the latest amendments made relating to indirect taxation.

ATTENDANCE AND CHANGE OF SUBJECTS:

1. A candidate shall be considered to have satisfied the requirement of attendance for a semester if he/she attends not less than 75% of the number of classes actually held up to the end of the semester in each of the subjects. There shall be no minimum attendance requirement for the Co-Curricular and extension activities.
2. An option to change a language/subject may be exercised only once, within four weeks from the date of commencement of the I Semester on payment of fee prescribed.
3. Whenever a change in a subject is permitted, the attendance in the changed subject shall be calculated by taking into consideration the attendance in the previous subject studied.

4. If a candidate represents his/her institution/University/ Karnataka State/ Nation in Sports/ NCC/ NSS/ Cultural or any officially sponsored activities he/she may be permitted to claim attendance for actual number of days participated, based on the recommendation of the Head of the Institution concerned.
5. A candidate who does not satisfy the requirement of attendance in one or more courses/subjects shall not be permitted to take the University examination of these courses/subjects and the candidate shall seek re-admission to those courses/subjects in a subsequent year.

COURSE PATTERNS AND SCHEMES OF EXAMINATIONS

The details of Course Patterns (hours of instructions per week) and the Schemes of Examinations of the different degree programmes are given in appendix "A". The Syllabi of the courses shall be as prescribed by Board of Studies of University.

CONTINUOUS FORMATIVE EVALUATION/ INTERNAL ASSESSMENT:

1. Total marks for each course shall be based on continuous assessments and semester and examinations. As per the decision taken at the Karnataka State Higher Education Council, it is necessary to have uniform pattern of 40 : 60 for IA and Semester End theory examinations respectively and 50 : 50 for IA and Semester End practical examinations respectively, in all the Universities, their Affiliated and Autonomous Colleges.

Total Marks for each course	= 100%
Continuous assessment (C1)	= 20% marks
Continuous assessment (C2)	= 20% marks
Semester End Examination (C3)	= 60% marks.

Evaluation process of IA marks shall be as follows:

- a) The first component (C1) of assessment is for 20% marks. This shall be based on test, assignment, seminar, case study, field work, project work etc. This assessment and score process should be completed after completing 50% of syllabus of the course/s and within 45 working days of semester program.
- b) The second component (C2) of assessment is for 20% marks. This shall be based on test, assignment, seminar, case study, field work,

internship / industrial practicum / project work etc. This assessment and score process should be based on completion of remaining 50 percent of syllabus of the courses of the semester.

- c) During the 17th - 19th week of the semester, a semester end examination shall be conducted by the University for each course. This forms the third and final component of assessment (C3) and the maximum marks for the final component will be 60%.
- d) In case of a student who has failed to attend the C1 or C2 on a scheduled date, it shall be deemed that the student has dropped the test. However, in case of a student who could not take the test on scheduled date due to genuine reasons, such a candidate may appeal to the Program Coordinator/Principal. The Program Coordinator / Principal in consultation with the concerned teacher shall decide about the genuineness of the case and decide to conduct special test to such candidate on the date fixed by the concerned teacher but before commencement of the concerned semester end examinations.
- e) For assignments, tests, case study analysis etc., of C1 and C2, the students should bring their own answer scripts (A4 size), graph sheets etc., required for such tests/assignments and these be stamped by the concerned department using their department seal at the time of conducting tests / assignment / work etc.
- f) The outline for continuous assessment activities for Component-I (C1) and Component-II (C2) of a course shall be as under.

- For practical course of full credits, Seminar shall not be compulsory. In its place, marks shall be awarded for Practical Record Maintenance. (the ratio is 50% : 50%)

- Conduct of Seminar, Case study / Assignment, etc. can be either in C1 or in C2 component at the convenience of the concerned teacher.
 - The teachers concerned shall conduct test / seminar / case study, etc. The students should be informed about the modalities well in advance. The evaluated courses / assignments during component I (C1) and component II (C2) of assessment are immediately provided to the candidates after obtaining acknowledgement in the register by the concerned teachers(S) and maintained by the Chairman in the case of a University Post-Graduate Department and the Principal / Director in the case of affiliated institutions. Before commencement of the semester and examination, the evaluated test, assignment etc. of C1 and C2 shall be obtained back to maintain them till the announcement of the results of the examination of the concerned semester.
- g) The marks of the internal assessment shall be published on the notice board of the department / college for information of the students.
 - h) The Internal assessment marks shall be communicated to the Registrar (Evaluation) at least 10 days before the commencement of the University examinations and the Registrar (E) shall have access to the records of such periodical assessments.
 - i) There shall be no minimum in respect of internal assessment marks.
 - j) Internal assessment marks may be recorded separately. A candidate who was failed or rejected the result, shall remain the internal assessment marks.

CONDUCT OF EXAMINATIONS:

A candidate shall register for the courses of a semester for which he/she fulfills the requirements and wishes to take the examinations.

- a) There shall be examinations at the end of each semester, ordinarily during November-December for odd semesters and during May-June for even semesters, as prescribed in the Scheme of Examinations.
- b) Unless otherwise stated in the schemes of examinations, practical examinations shall be conducted at the end of each semester. They shall be conducted by two examiners, one internal and one external and shall never be conducted by both internal examiners. The statement

of marks sheet and the answer books of practical examinations shall be sent to the Registrar (Evaluation) by the Chief Superintendent of the respective Colleges immediately after the practical examinations.

- c) The candidate shall submit the record book for practical examination duly certified by the course teacher and the H.O.D./staff in-charge. It shall be evaluated at the end of the Semester at the practical examination.

MINIMUM FOR A PASS :

- a) No candidate shall be declared to have passed the Semester Examination as the case may be under each course/paper unless he/she obtains not less than 35% marks in written examination /practical examination and 40% marks in the aggregate of written/practical examination and internal assessment put together in each of the courses and 40% marks (including IA) in Project work and viva wherever prescribed.
- b) A candidate shall be declared to have passed the program if he/she secures at least 40% of marks or a CGPA of 4.0 (Course Alpha-Sign Grade P) in the aggregate of both internal assessment and semester end examination marks put together in each unit such as theory papers/practical / field work / internship / project work / dissertation / viva-voce, provided the candidate has secured at least 40% of marks in the semester and examinations in each unit.
- c) The candidates who pass all the end semester examinations in the first attempts are eligible for ranks provided they secure at least CGPA of 6.00 (Alpha-Sign Grade B+).
- d) A candidate who passes the end-semester examinations in parts is eligible for only Class, CGPA and Alpha-Sign Grade but not for ranking.
- e) The results of the candidates who have passed the last semester examination but not passed the lower semester examinations shall be declared as NCL (Not Completed the Lower Semester Examinations). Such candidates shall be eligible for the degree only after completion of all the lower semester examinations.
- f) If a candidate fails in a subject, either in theory or in practicals, he/she shall appear for that subject only at any subsequent regular examination, as prescribed for completing the programme. He/she must obtain the

minimum marks for a pass in that subject (theory and practicals, separately) as stated above.

CARRY OVER:

Candidates who fail in lower semester examinations may go to the higher semesters and take the lower semester examinations.

CLASSIFICATION OF SUCCESSFUL CANDIDATES :

An alpha-sign grade, the eight point grading system, as described below may be adopted. The declaration of result is based on the Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) earned towards the end of each semester or the Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) earned towards the completion of all the eight semesters of the programme and the corresponding overall alpha-sign grades. If some candidates exit at the completion of first, second or third year of the four years Undergraduate Programmes, with Certificate, Diploma or the Basic Degree, respectively, then the results of successful candidates at the end of second, fourth or sixth semesters shall also be classified on the basis of the Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) obtained in the two, four, six or eight semesters respectively, for award of

- Certificate in Arts/ Science /Commerce
- Diploma in Arts/ Science /Commerce
- Bachelor's Degree in Arts/ Science /Commerce
- Bachelor's Degree with Honours in a Discipline / Subject

In addition to the above, successful candidates at the end of tenth semester of the integrated Master's Degree Programmes, shall also be classified on the basis of CGPA obtained in the ten semesters of the Programmes. Likewise, the successful candidates of one year or two semesters Master's Degree Programmes are also classified on the basis of CGPA of two semesters of the Master's Degree Programmes.

TRANSFER OF ADMISSION :

Transfer of admissions are permissible only for odd semesters for students of other universities and within the University.

1. Conditions for transfer of admission of students within the University
 - a) His/her transfer admission shall be within the intake permitted to the college.

CO-CURRICULAR AND EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES IN THE COLLEGE

To facilitate cultural and intellectual growth among the students, the college carries out a variety of activities through the following Associations. The students are encouraged to excel in activities such as debate, elocution, writing, music, dancing etc. as determined by the individual talents and aptitudes.

STUDENTS UNION

An elected student body with representation from all classes, this forum grooms the students for leadership skills.

Fine Arts Association

A forum for art enthusiasts, this association gives opportunities for creative self expression through exposure to the fine arts like Drawing, Painting, Craft, Music etc. as also the performing arts like dance and theatre. Reputed artists and exponents of the performing arts are often invited to guide the students through guest lectures.

National Service Scheme (N.S.S.):

A national level youth forum, the N.S.S. involves the students in community projects and nation building activities through volunteer service. The N.S.S. unit of the college has undertaken several projects over the years whereby students of the college have made meaningful contribution to society.

As Human Resource Development has assumed great significance in modern times, this forum strives to develop HR skills among the students. Members of this forum gain good exposure to the latest concepts in HR through interactive session with experts in the field. Total Quality Management is the need of the hour.

Energy & Eco Club:

This club creates in the students an awareness & love for the environment they live in.

Women's Cell:

A forum which enables the students to keep abreast of contemporary issues relation to women, the Women's cell helps the students to clarify their thoughts on women's empowerment and develop proactive qualities for personal growth. The various problems faced by women in society are dealt with and the students are given guidance in coping with them.

Wall Magazine:

A publication edited and published entirely by the students, the Wall Magazine helps the students to exhibit their talents and hone their skills to perfection.
